

## The Madonna of The Third Millennium: Singing In The Reign

To me it seems a little strange to be wishing you a "Happy New Year" when the year ahead of us seems to promise being just a continuation of bad news of the years that preceded it. Wars, revolutions, mass murders, terrorist attacks, more people leaving the Church than entering it and the continuing disintegration of a society that used to be based on Christian values, etc., are enough to depress and weaken the faith of any thoughtful person. Yet there was another bad time when the total number of Christian believers numbered only one - the Blessed Virgin Mary, and the real "New Year" began 2,000 years ago when she heard the Word of God and let it grow in her heart.

As a peasant girl living in poverty in an oppressed nation, Mary was the first to hear the Good News of the Messiah from the Archangel Gabriel. Nurturing Jesus under her heart, her love for God continued to grow. She became His first disciple. She immediately carried the Good News to her cousin St. Elizabeth and

so became Jesus' first apostle and evangelist. Then she accompanied Him all the way to His death on the Cross, to His glorious Resurrection and Ascension. She was the support of first Christian community praying in the Upper Room and waited with them to receive the Holy Spirit and be sent on mission to the ends of the earth. Thus, Mary gave birth to the Church and was its support at the beginning and will be so until the end of time.

In 1858, in Lourdes, France, another little girl named Bernadette Soubirous received the Good News from the Blessed Virgin Mary. Poor and uneducated, she could not read or write. At the age of 14, even though she had not learned her catechism well enough to receive her first Holy Communion, the Blessed Virgin appeared to her 18 times! Why was she chosen for this great grace? The reason was that, like Mary, Bernadette was empty of self-concern. Humble and obedient, she was ready to do the will of God. "Behold, the handmaid of the Lord, let it be done to me according to Your word!" This faith that sees everything, even suffering as a grace, Bernadette

saw as an opportunity of selfemptying and opening herself to the will of God. This attitude, like that of the Blessed Virgin Mary, can be seen in some of Bernadette's prayers:

"For the poverty, in which my mother and father lived, for the failure of the mill, for all the hard times, for the awful sheep, for constant tiredness, thank you my God! Thank you, my God, for the prosecutor and the police commissioner, for the policemen, and for the harsh words of Father Peyramale! For my spelling which I never learned, for the memory which I never had, for my ignorance and for my stupidity, thank you. Thank you for the fact that it is me who was the Bernadette threatened with imprisonment because she had seen you, Holy Virgin; regarded by people as a rare animal; that Bernadette so wretched, that upon seeing her it was said: 'Is that it'? For this miserable body which You gave me, for this burning and suffocating illness, for my decaying tissues, for my de-calcified bones, for my fever, for my dull

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and for my acute pains, thank you my God. And for this soul which you have given me, for the desert of inner dryness, for Your night and Your lightening, for Your silences and Your thunders, for everything. For You, when You were present and when You were not, thank you, Jesus" ("The Gift of Faith," Fr. Tadeusz Dajczer, In the Arms of Mary Foundation, Fort Collins, CO, 2008, pp.32-33)

This issue of Echoes is bookended by the Feast of the Solemnity of Mary the Holy Mother of God (Jan. 1) and Ash Wednesday (Feb. 26.) In the middle is the Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes (Feb. 11). This is a blessed reminder that in a world that has chased God out the Christian rejoices that there is a God, that He loves us, is not ashamed of or angry at us, and that He has entered into our flesh to suffer and die, to rise and invite us to share in His mission for the salvation of souls. Ash Wednesday reminds that by dying to ourselves and entering into the Cross we find many opportunities while still on earth to be united with Christ and prepared for sharing Eternal Life with Him in the communion of saints. Perhaps one way of doing this is learning not to complain about our sufferings, and not trying to make excuses for our faults and limitations - like Bernadette; to offer our suffering for our own conversion and that of other sinners, and for the perseverance of the just. Finally, to have joy in the companionship we share with

Mary, Bernadette and all the saints on the journey of faith.



A recent pilgrim returned from Lourdes and conveyed to me the following good news. Her young daughter had contracted Lyme disease and was confined to a wheelchair. She took her to numerous doctors in the area (Virginia) and to specialists in New York and Boston...all to no avail. They decided to go on a pilgrimage to Lourdes. Her daughter was assisted into the baths by the workers there. After submersion in the waters she was able to get up and walk out alone, no assistance and no more wheelchair!

I wanted to express my appreciation of what you do, generally, with your newsletters, and more particularly, to thank you for the powerful letter about what happened to the Cathedral of Notre Dame at the start of Holy Week. Of the many responses I read after the fire, yours was the most moving and straightforward, describing it for what it was. And what you went on to write about the overall decline in our culture is very important, as fewer and fewer people seem to be able to recognize what is happening. People do not seem to realize that the casual recourse to abortions in our society is a stepping stone to euthanasia, which for awhile will be voluntary, but I am afraid it will not be too long before there will be medical mandates requiring a "quietus" for older people and those with serious enough physical or mental problems. The younger generations are becoming more and more insensitive to basic human values due to the poisonous effects of perceiving reality through what a computer screen

can show them of life. So, thank you for your strong words and call to prayer and faith. **CS** 

(Normally we publish letters about physical healing at Lourdes. But there is another, greater healing, i.e. that of the heart. #### UNIQUE IN THE ANNALS OF LOURDES

Guy Ledet was a normal child until the age of five. Then he was stricken with acute meningo-encephalitis - a brain disease that can wreck the nervous system. He came out of it alive, but paralyzed in both arms and legs and subject to frequent convulsions and epileptic fits. Worst of all, he sank into a state of progressive mental breakdown which ended in complete mental failure. "He didn't even recognize us," his mother said, "He couldn't speak at all and lost all the happy little vocabulary that he had before his illness. He forgot how to eat, dirtied himself without realizing what he was doing." This condition lasted for nearly two years. His parents all but ruined themselves financially in their effort to cure him - all in vain. The doctors pronounced Guy incurable. Then they thought of Lourdes. They took him to the baths, and while compassionate nurses went to lower Guy into the baths, his father prayed outside on his knees. When they came out and handed him back to his mother it happened. Guy opened his eyes, looked about himself with an intelligent glance, lifted his arms towards his mother and with a clear childish voice cried out "Mama!" He was taken home, and within a year recovered his normal mentality. One year after his cure Guy was examined by 40 doctors and declared "normal," although they declined to proclaim it a formal "published" cure. "What do we care about that," said the mother, "We have our boy, happy and well. Our 'Te Deums' are sung right here at home every day!" # The New Evangelization: Sowing the Seeds of Faith

By Fr. Francis A. Grispino, S.M. Pope Francis has called us to circle the wagons and take a stand against the world-weary and those who have lost their moral compass. The suggestion offered to the inner circle is simple and doable.

#### **Holy Father's Suggestion**

The Pope urges Catholics to tell anyone willing to listen the one thing that he or she loves about the Catholic Faith. You may want to back away from such an invitation. The mere mentioning of sharing publicly something of your inner convictions may cause you to be fearful.

#### **Fear of the New**

Gideon of the Bible comes to mind. He became fearful when told by the Lord to lead an army into battle. After all, he was just a farmer, with no military experience. His fear was met with these words, "Go with the strength you have....and I will be with you" (Judges 6, 4 & 16.)

St. Peter had the intuition of divine power emanating from Jesus in the miraculous catch of fish and was fearful. Jesus' response was, "Be not afraid, from now on you will be catching men" (Luke 5, 10.) In both instances fear was conquered by reliance on the Holy Spirit, the

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Spirit of Jesus, the same Spirit has been bestowed upon us at our baptism.

#### **Second Suggestion**

This idea comes from the letter of James. He points out a fault we easily fall prey to and that is to forget our reliance on God who sustains us in all our comings and goings. He complains how we make plans for ourselves, weeks, months, and years in advance with no thought of God. God is shut out of the equation. The suggestion he offers is to mention God upon whom we so sorely depend and say, "If the Lord wills we shall live to do this or that" (James 4, 17.) We can use the short form and simply say "God willing." So, the next time you plan an activity, for example, "I am planning to visit the Grand Canyon next summer" or, "I'm planning to visit the grand-children in Omaha" simply add the words, "God willing."

#### **The Big Question**


How can such a remark contribute to the New Evangelization? Your use of the word "God" shows consciousness of God in your life and may open the doors in the hearts of the others to be aware of "God" in theirs.

#### **Third Suggestion**

This suggestion is much like the second but for the fact that you add the words, "Thank God." The occasion may arise in a response to a simple question or greeting, "Hi! How are you doing?" Normally we respond, "Fine, and you?" Why not respond, "I am fine, thank God, how are you doing?" Again, the contribution to the New Evangelization is consciousness of God in your life and may rub off into the consciousness of the other.

#### **Deeper Reason**

One other reason comes to mind to give support to the New Evangelization in today's world. You have heard the saying "Out of sight, out of mind." Well, it works in this sense too, "Out of mind, out of heart." This is one of the strategies used by Secular Humanists. By exorcizing the very word "God" from human discourse the death of God will surely take place in the human heart. If so, Secular Humanism wins! The "Sowers of God's Seed of Faith" will not let that happen, will they?
